
Annual Membership Renewal

Second Edition of the BBSAI Book of Registry



The Second Edition of the BBSAI Book of Registry is available for sale now! This new February 2009 edition of our Book of Registry lists all 1,675 registered and recorded American Blackbelly and Barbados Blackbelly sheep together with sire and dam information, enabling breeders to cross-reference and track heritages of registered stock throughout the United States and surrounding countries.

As with the First Edition of the Book of Registry, this invaluable tool for serious breeders of AB and BB stock contains three sets of data: 1) the Registry sorted by registration number with subsections for the AB and BB breeds, 2) the Registry sorted by breeder name, and 3) the Breeder's Directory (containing names and contact information of all BBSAI member breeders who have authorized their names to appear in public on the BBSAI website.

Like the earlier edition, the new February 2009 BBSAI Book of Registry is a wire-bound 8.5" x 11" document of approximately 80 pages, and is available for \$20.00. Why do we need the BBSAI Book of Registry? Let me count the ways.

First, this is the only way any of us have of finding out about our sheep's ancestors, unless we all want to be constantly calling up our Registrar, asking her to look up ancestors on the database.

Second, it is the only written record, other than the database, that tells the history of the actual Barbados Blackbelly being bred in this country by naming individual sheep.

Third, it provides the same information that most breeds' stud books provide - and then some - be it dog, sheep, cat, horses, etc.

Fourth, if and when we make connections with registries of other countries, it is proof positive of our efforts to register our sheep and proof that as breed keepers we make serious efforts to keep accurate records.

Fifth, if we are ever in the future going to make any headway with the Barbados Ministry of Agriculture, what an impact it would have for them to know how important the breed is to shepherds in the United States!

All of that said, the BBSAI Book of Registry reflects on all of us; it does so much to promote our breed and to show that we are our breed's keepers; it makes all of the breeders proud to be a part of it; and it is a legacy that we leave to document our breed for the future!

Hooray for the second edition of the BBSAI Book of Registry! And also – why stop now? This is something that should be ongoing, don't you think?

A huge thank you to Mary Swindell for her many months of effort to bring to fruition both editions. The glory is yours alone, Mary, for giving us something we can be forever proud of. What a wonderful tool you have given us to compile and research our pedigrees.

BOARD MEMBER SPOTLIGHT By JoAnne Hamsher, President

It has been somewhat of a whirlwind experience for me raising Barbados Blackbelly sheep! Although, I have raised polled cattle and horses for twenty years. Two short years ago, I wanted to add a few less discriminate grazers to my small horse ranch. I had paint show horses, which by nature, are very choosey about what they eat. So they graze the good grass, but leave behind weeds and brush. I wanted to add a few goats or sheep who would clean up the left over's. My research led me to Mary Swindell, who I called for information about this beautiful breed. She offered me a ton of information, and also directed me to the Consortium and Carol Elkins. The information that I received from both Mary and Carol had convinced me that I would like to become involved with raising BB sheep. So, I set out on my quest to obtain very hard-tofind Barbados Blackbelly ewes.

Within a couple of months, I had been fortunate enough to find 5 sheep. 4 ewes and 1 ram. From there, my flock began. I spent many weekends with my husband, John, travelling across the country and back again, purchasing sheep from excellent bloodlines. We quickly grew our flock to a size that crowded out the horses. Since we had fallen so in love with this magnificent breed, and I had gotten involved in the BBSAI in different ways, we felt that our passion was for the sheep, not the horses. So we sold our horses to make room for an even bigger flock.

Now, we have approximately 50 sheep, all registered, pure bred Barbados Blackbelly. We have bought a larger farm, which affords us many acres to continue to grow our flock.

With a flock of that size, I have experienced many things in these two years: I have seen and/or assisted with many lamb births; I have hand raised a wonderful bottle baby; I have lost sheep to coyotes and then learned to love livestock guardian dogs; I have even recently had to perform an episiotomy to pull out a set of twisted twins, which without intervention, would have killed the ewe.

But, my love of raising animals does not end with the sheep. We have three Anatolian Shepherd Dogs that are the best livestock guardian dogs that a person can have

I have a couple of red Angus, which we raise just for consumption. We also have 40 chickens, and a dozen Boer Goats, which we raise for our needs. My freezer is always full, and we eat only what we raise. I no longer purchase any meat from the grocery store. I know what my animals have been fed, how they have been raised, and that they have had no chemical intervention.

I enjoy all of my animals, but these sheep are my joy and passion every single day. No matter how rough the day at the office is, I know I can come home and spend some time in the barn, and be renewed again!! It's definitely the best hobby I have ever had!

BBSAI Board Votes Update

(A summary of BBSAI Board of Directors voting issues since last newsletter)

6/16/2009

Vote to change the address on the registration form to Mary Swindell, Registrar's address. This will result in less delay.

(9 yes, 0 abstain, 0 no). Passed.

Vote to create policy that BBSAI will not "own" photographs required of members, such as mandatory registration photos. Registration form will simply state "photographs will not be returned." (9 yes, 0 abstain, 0 no). Passed.

Vote that the Board of Directors can vote to allow someone with need - such as education committee, webmistress, etc. to peruse registration photos. If some are found to be desirable, the permission of the photographer is required. If photographer agrees, and the photos are used, attribution must be given to the photographer or the BBSAI, but not the author of the article.

(9 yes, 0 abstain, 0 no). Passed.

Vote that photographs submitted voluntarily, such as for the photo contest, etc., may be used by the BBSAI for publications without paying royalties to the photographer, but will remain the property of photographer for their own use as well. Permission for use is not required, but attribution must be given to photographer.

(9 yes, 0 abstain, 0 no). Passed.
